


The top five shows in New York



Janet Cardiff

Sixth Avenue and Central Park South T+1 212 446 9529

Known for her signature audio walks, Janet Cardiff has created a 35-minute journey along the 19th-century paths of Central Park. The work, Her Long Black Hair, encourages listeners to follow in the footsteps of an enigmatic dark-haired woman by mixing a personal narrative with local history. This major survey of over 200 works on paper highlights Ruscha's interest in unusual media: he has made pieces using diverse materials such as chocolate, fruit juice, blood and gunpowder. Marepe

A native of Bahia, Marepe transforms found materials into art while addressing the social issues connected with multi-racial Brazil. His work has evolved from a deep connection with local traditions and combines indigenous practices with European cultural influences. 
